





- 2007 Volunteering began from Big Green Week in 2007 which launched 60% Carbon reduction by 2020 strategy
- 2010 Volunteering scheme took off from (even bigger) Big Green Week
- 2014 Environmental Action Society created
- 2015 Leicester Award in Sustainability updated to Sustainable Development Programme
- 2015 Nominated for Best New Society
- 2015 Funding for SEED approved and launched
- 2015 SSWG trials first year
- 2016 EAS won Campaigning Society of the year






Getting the word out

- Get in touch with your allocated member of staff, they may have suggestions, contacts, and knowledge to help you.
- Arrange a list of all the things you may need to pay for – absolutely everything, from travel and transport, materials, printing, labour, renting equipment.
- The maximum you could receive from the SEED fund is £500 so don't exceed this in your proposal.

Goal Setting


1# Make sure your goal is clear. It needs to be SMART:

- · Specific clearly defined goal
- Measurable able to track progress and success
- Attainable realistic chance of aspired outcome
- Relevant achieves what you want it to achieve
- Time-bound has a start and end time

- Completely student-led





The Green Pitch

- **Project:** This is a project where students can pitch an idea to do something green on campus, they can win up to £1000 to put their idea into action.
- **Top Tips:** Engage some interested students who can help spread the message for you to their peers, as well as with faculties so they can promote it to their students.
- **Dos:** Suggest examples / give example of previous winners so they can see what is achievable
- Do Nots: submit all the pitches to a public vote without vetting someone won't be achievable / will need tweaking



- **Project:** Our ARU Green Student Societies Fund offers relatively small amounts of funding to student clubs and societies in return for them undertaking environmental activities.
- **Top Tips:** Ask for testimonials from successful clubs/socs to use to advertise the project
- **Dos:** Meet with clubs and socs to talk to them face to face. Work with the SU for support/advice.
- **Do Nots:** accept insufficient evidence some may want to take advantage as an easy way to get money



The Student Society Green Fund



The Student Society Green Fund is a source of extra funding for your club or society, provided by the ARU Environment Team. The money can be used towards expenses such as equipment, trips or guest speakers, but must benefit the society in some way. All we ask in return is your society completes some criteria aimed at helping your club or society become more environmentally aware.
